Volunteers are needed to assist with the processing of the Williamsburg Collection, at the office in Williamsburg, Virginia. During each work session, volunteers will go through boxes of documents and sort them into categories of like items. Some volunteers will scan documents and enter data into Meta-Murray. During each session, there will be a "read-in" time to allow volunteers to do personal research. Summer work sessions usually begin on Monday mornings and finish on Wednesday at 5:00 p.m. (Note different days for the August session.) Lodging will be provided for Sunday - Wednesday evenings. Tentative dates are: June 13 - 15, July 11 - 13, and August 6 - 9 (begin at 2:00 on Saturday, finish at noon on Tuesday). Three volunteers are needed for each session. The Chalkboard: Quotes from Dr. Murray Bowen



For each email blast from *The Murray Bowen Archives Project*, we include "The Chalkboard," quotes from Dr. Bowen, or in this case, communication to Dr. Bowen, drawn from materials in the Williamsburg Collection. This month's quote is from a note written to Dr. Bowen in 1949, during the time he was at the Menninger Clinic in Topeka, KS. Even during that early period - long before the theory emerged - hints of the importance of thinking, objectivity, and a "dispassionate evaluation of reality" show evidence of the theory's underlying principles.

Dear Dr. Bowen.

Two weeks ago tonite you walked into the office and found me crying, in as severe a state of shock and as badly out of control as I've ever been in my life. The help you gave me then not only enabled me to gather up some shreds of self control and act reasonably that night, but it also somehow started a process of re-orientation in my thinking about my job and my relationship to the Foundation. I didn't sleep much that night and I cried an awful lot, but I did some thinking, too, in the direction that you'd started me and took the first step toward an increasing objectivity that has gotten me through these two difficult weeks...

I think it was the complete sincerity of what you said, along with a rare combination of warm friendliness and dispassionate evaluation of reality that helped me so much... I'm grateful.
